Gold Star daughter pays tribute to dad

In 2018, Shannon Celiz was only 8 years old when her father, SFC Christopher A. Celiz, was killed in action in Afghanistan. Three years later, Shannon is a fifth grader in the Savannah area and uses the stability of her education to pay tribute to her fallen hero.

"My daughter told me that her life is like a Jenga tower and most of the sturdy pieces have been removed since the death of her father. She feels as though her school is the last sturdy piece remaining at the bottom of the tower," says Shannon's mother, Katherine Celiz. "If we take that away, her tower will fall down."

The Celiz family has received support from The Folded Flag Foundation, a 501(c)3 nonproft organization that provides a pathway for thousands of Gold Star spouses and children (under the age of 26) to obtain an education and establish a career. With education as the cornerstone, the foundation offers scholarship and grant opportunities for college students, as well as for summer school and summer-related activities for younger students.

"Without organizations like The Folded Flag Foundation, I don't know if I would be able to keep my daughter's Jenga tower standing tall," Celiz added.

Ella's project, "How do low-glycemic sugar alternatives affect bread yeast growth?" compared multiple natural sweeteners in the process of baking bread. The project won first place for biochemistry at the Regional Science Fair earlier this year before advancing to state.

grade. Shaffer's third-grade science fair project won first in the region testing yeast growth with sugar, honey, and saccharin.

In subsequent years, Shaffer's experiments with various sugars and yeast continued. In seventh grade last year she tested fruit/vegetable juices (apple, orange, carrot, celery) with yeast growth. This year she tested yeast growth with low-glycemic sugar alternatives.

"I'm extremely proud of Ella and what she's been able to accomplish during her middle school career at The STEM Academy," said Jimmy Cave, STEM principal. "Her latest achievement, the Grand Awardin Biochemistry, is outstanding! Ella is an exceptional student and I'm looking forward to hearing about her next accomplishment."

"It has been a pleasure to watch Ella grow academically during her time here at STEM. She has already accomplished so much, and I have no doubt that will continue as she enters high school," added Lauren Kelly, STEM Academy STEAM Coordinator.
